it takes little imagination, upon entering this delicately detailed study of French Provincial style, to conjure the aroma of baking croissants and all manner of bon nourriture. Looking across such incandescence it takes quite a deal of imagination, however, to believe this was once a cluttered kitchen-scape, poorly designed and begging for a makeover.

In what can only be described as yet another example of design excellence by Impala Kitchens, the new installation beams with brilliant freshness, making the most of a beautiful bay window aspect and clean colour palette. Pure magic is performed with the easy integration of all the modern conveniences — in terms of manufacture and appliances — alongside

intricate design details that successfully evince the charm of a well-maintained rural galley in France.

A formal style that harkens to rustic rhythms for warmth, the French Provincial look is achieved through a general balance and symmetry as well as the application of architectural features such as elaborate capping on the cabinetry, ornately carved corbels and fluted panels, not to mention the personal touch of handpainted mouldings and heritage doors.

Asked by the owners to utilise the richness of jarrah timber for the benchtops, the island bench becomes a focal point of the area, setting a boundary point for the kitchen as well as a means for easy access to other parts of the home. **LKB**
